




CALL TO PRAYER AND SELF-DENIAL TECHNOLOGY GRANTS

National Total Recommended: \$365,700.00

1. Alaska Child & Family, Anchorage, Alaska, \$10,000, to help upgrade two aging servers with new virtual servers and an MS Server 2012 operating system.


- 2. Amarillo Wesley Community Center, Amarillo, Texas, \$15,000, to help purchase Smart Boards and computers for the children and youth programs as well as a monitored security camera system to enhance education and security at the facility.
- 3. Cornerstone Family Ministries, Tampa, Florida, \$15,000, to help purchase a Smart Board for the Children Nutrition Connection, laptop computers for the Learning Center Lab School, and a Smart Board with electrical wiring for the Academy Training Center.
- **4.** Dallas Bethlehem Center, Dallas, Texas, \$10,000, to help purchase computers and printers for the Success Readiness Center for School and Life and a security camera for the building.
- 5. David & Margaret Youth & Family Services, La Verne, California, \$15,000, for technology upgrades in the Whitney Building and purchasing enterprise encryption software and a server, which will allow the institution to increase the network infrastructure and maintain progression toward HIPAA.
- **6. Dulac Community Center, Dulac, Louisiana, \$14,000,** for computers and tablets to be used in the computer drop-in center and for computer training classes.
- 7. Dumas Wesley Community Center, Mobile, Alabama, \$14,000, toward the purchase of computers and software for a computer and web programming class for at-risk youth.
- 8. Epworth Village, York, Nebraska, \$10,000, to help purchase desktop computers, laptops and software to improve the server capacity.
- 9. 

- **13. Moore Community House, Biloxi, Mississippi, \$10,000,** to help purchase tablets for Early Head Start teachers and software for TS Gold Child Assessments to improve early childhood educational services to enrolled children.
- **14. Navajo United Methodist Center, Farmington, New Mexico, \$6,000,** to help purchase computers, printers, business/office software, a projector, a camera and a surveillance system.
- **15. Neighborhood Services Organization, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, \$15,000,** to help purchase of an audio-video system in the conference room, used as a life-skills training room for clients, a job fair venue and a meeting place for the board and other stakeholders.

- **21.Toberman Neighborhood Center, San Pedro, California, \$10,000,** to help purchase of laptops, digital signage and software, and mobile audio/visual equipment, which will create a mechanisms for family members to engage in joint learning and work toward their goals.

Environmental Justice Projects

Black Mesa Water Coalition, Flagstaff, Arizona, \$10,000, for programming that preserves and protects the environment and the integrity of indigenous peoples' cultures and builds sustainable and healthy communities.

Climate Justice Alliance, Albuquerque, New Mexico, \$10,000, to organize local and regional communities, grow the broader climate movement, and influence and protect environmental/climate justice provisions in state and federal policies.

Grassroots International, Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts, \$10,000, to strengthen an emerging rural women's environmental justice movement in five West African Countries that is seeking to provide a sustainable, grassroots alternative to corporate farming.

Hattie B. Cooper Community Center, Roxbury, Massachusetts, \$10,000, for a neighborhood-driven environmental justice initiative focused on the park adjacent to the center.

Little Village Environmental Justice Organization, Chicago, Illinois, \$10,000, to create an environmental justice caucus to support the Illinois Climate Table and ensure that frontline communities and environmental justice concerns are considered in policy.

North Shore Waterfront Conservancy of Staten Island, Staten Island, New York, \$10,000, to educate students, promote safe and sustainable public access to the waterfront, and build environmental awareness among the people living on Staten Island's North Shore.


